CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS - Bishop Barb Collins

Bishop: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The word of the cross is the wisdom of God to those who are saved. Merciful God, we confess our bewilderment over the presence of any wisdom at all in such a dreadful act as the crucifixion of Jesus, your Son, our Lord. It seems as though evil triumphed in this wretched deed.

She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." ¹⁴When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). . ¹⁷Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

MESSAGE ~ Rev. Rev. Craig Miller, Assistant to the Bishop, Upper Susquehanna Synod. A brief message of resurrection hope while we maintain our distance one from another.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

In John's telling of the resurrection the only person to come to the tomb that morning was Mary, called the Magdalene. Perhaps she had company, but John records only her name.

Coming early on that Sunday morning, before the sun had risen, she confronts a most bewildering sight: The stone that covered the opening to the cave in which Jesus was buried had been rolled away. Running to find the disciples she reports this news, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb"...

Notice her assumption: "They have taken the Lord..." As of yet she had not looked to see; she just knew.

When confronted by uncertainty it is natural for us to try to understand.

What is happening? What should I do?

We want answers! And when those answers do not come, we make assumptions with our limited knowledge. We just know.

What are some of the assumptions you have made these last few months?

The virus won't be so bad - it's like the flu or a common cold.

It won't affect us here; it's only in the cities.

I'm healthy. I don't need to worry or take any precautions.

This will be bad and I'm going to get sick, even die.

Experts will protect us.

Experts don't know how to protect us.

I don't need to wear a mask.

These and other assumptions are our way of gaining a sense of control over what we do not understand. In the same way we make assumptions about other peoples, races, nationalities, and more.

We are in an anxious time, a time of great uncertainty; but we cannot let our assumptions get in the way of the truth. Yet this is what we do.

After she alerted the disciples to the empty tomb, Mary returned with Peter and another disciple. The disciples confirmed her suspicion – the tomb indeed was empty – but they did not confirm her assumption. Indeed, one disciple, we are told, believed that Jesus had been raised. It seems, however, that he failed to tell Mary.

After the two disciples left, Mary lingered at the tomb, long enough to see the angels; and still she could not truly see. Once again, she says, "They have taken away my Lord." And even when Jesus himself stood before her and spoke to her she could not see. "Sir", she says, "if you have carried him away..." Only when Jesus says her name does Mary begin to understand the truth. Jesus' speaking her name finally breaks down her assumptions, breaks through her anxiety and fear, and opens her to see.

Jesus speaks to Mary in that place of death and shows her life, his life and hers. My friends, Jesus is speaking to you today, in the midst of uncertainty, in the midst of fear and anxiety. He speaks your name. He calls out to you:

"My beloved child, my brother, my sister; my friend, you are joined to me in death so that in me you may live. You assumed death was final, but I have trampled down death. You assumed evil has power over you, but I have conquered evil."

Jesus has won the victory over the grave but, more than that, Jesus has defeated our assumptions and replaced them with truth, the truth that by clinging to his death on the cross we gain life, and by loving our neighbor we live that life now. Oh, what joy we have when we hear our name spoken by Jesus as he gives us his body and blood; when he says "This is given for YOU!"

Although we cannot partake in that meal while we maintain our distance from one another, the Holy Week just past reminds us that Jesus has indeed given himself for us, his body broken and blood poured out on the cross.

Christ is risen and death is overcome by death. Christ is risen and sins are forgiven.

Christ is risen and our assumptions are exposed to the true light of God's love. Christ is risen and our joy is made complete in his eternal life.

In this current climate of anxiety and fear, we can speak the word of truth: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

Praise be to God! Alleluia!

Resurrection of Our Lord / Easter Day April 12, 2020

This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! Indeed, "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34): Christ's resurrection truly brings life to everyone. We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love in the feast of holy communion. With the women at the tomb, we are astonished, elated, and grateful. We depart with joy to proclaim the good news of God's endless love.

O God, you gave your only Son to suffer death on the cross for our redemption, and by his glorious resurrection you delivered us from the power of death. Make us die every day to sin, that we may live with him forever in the joy of the resurrection, through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Acts 10:34-43

Peter's sermon, delivered at the home of Cornelius, a Roman army officer, is a summary of the essential message of Christianity: Everyone who believes in Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection fulfilled the words of the prophets, "receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Peter began to speak to [the people]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are

witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

John's gospel describes the confusion and excitement of the first Easter: the stone is moved, disciples race back and forth, and angels speak to a weeping woman. Then, Jesus himself appears.
