MESSAGE ~ Rev. Ela J. Robertson

Well, here we are "on the Air" As I stand in front of the big boom mic my husband has set up in our dining room, I can imagine seeing that 'On the Air" sign flashing in an old radio studio where a young woman raised in a gospel singing church is now given the chance to stardom, Singing her soul out (with the Holy Spirit) to an unknown audience who may or may not believe.

Air and breath are signs of the Holy Spirit. "Ruach" in Hebrew is Air, breath, Spirit. -

When in our Gospel today John tells us Jesus 'breathed on them, breathed on the Disciples' we know this is Christ giving the gift of the Holy Spirit to them. <u>Through</u>, receiving that Spirit they will be able to proclaim to others, 'We have seen the Lord, we know our Lord is risen. we have seen the Lord.'

Still, knowing that air and breath refer to the Holy Spirit in this Biblical context, I can't help but overlay our own situation today, and think about all those tiny crown viruses 'on the air' and have a knee jerk reaction to 'he breathed on them' - "gosh he was really getting too close for social distancing wasn't he?"

This is a challenge. Accepting where we are, as we are secluded within the walls of our home, we realize our fears and annoyances can not help but influence how we hear and see things. Yet, we can also realize Christ enters the walls to speak through this and to us.

The disciples, after they have received the Holy Spirit have been commissioned by Jesus: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." They are ready to share their news. The first person the group wants to share this with is their fellow disciple Thomas, who was not with them the night Jesus miraculously appeared to them in their locked and bolted room. They may have thought that Thomas would hear that they had seen the risen Lord and immediately rejoice and be glad with them.

We know it wasn't quite like that. This story is one we're all familiar with. Even people who may have never read the Bible, know what a Doubting Thomas is. This term has become a part of our popular culture. Interestingly, Thomas is not called 'Doubting Thomas' in the scripture. John introduces him as 'the one who was called the Twin.' He is also referred to as 'Didymus', a word in Greek translated as the 'Twin.' But nowhere in the Bible are we told who his twin is. As it is true in many kinds of literature, when a character is unnamed , it is as if the writer is asking the reader to stand in their place. So we become Thomas's twin. We become the twin, the very likeness of Doubting Thomas, the disciple who questioned, doubted and wanted proof.

Is there anyone out there today who can say you have never felt like a Doubting Thomas? Especially in these times. We hear the news of the doctor, one of the first fatalities to Covid-19, during the first outbreak in China who warned, "this could be very dangerous, we need to do something" and people responded, "Oh, we doubt it." When the first cases appeared in the US, doubled, tripled and the list of cancellations, prohibitions and social distancing measures changed every day, with each more restrictive move we questioned, "I doubt if we really have to do that do we?"

Sometimes we apologize for being a doubting Thomas, and sometimes we just unabashedly stick to our views, until we have proof to think otherwise. Questioning facts and other peoples' words in the world, may not be the same as questioning God' word and our faith. After Thomas has the proof he sought and touches Christ's wounds, Jesus says "do not doubt but believe." (John 20:27)

Jesus is not condemning Thomas for doubting, he is listening, he is meeting him where he is and helping him to faith. And what about us, Thomas' twins? John says these things are written, this story of Thomas is told so that <u>you</u>, you dear readers and listeners through the centuries, you who have not seen, may believe and have life. God recognizes that humanity, twins of Thomas, will question, will doubt yet God gives us proof if we need it and makes it possible for us to believe.

A victim of years of torture in a Hanoi prison during the Vietnam war, James Stockdale, credited his survival to a combination of Faith and facts, a melding of "absolute, unwavering faith that you can prevail," with "the discipline to begin by confronting the brutal facts, whatever they are."*

Through grace we have faith that we are one in the family of God, believers, doubters, faithful, factfinders. As brothers and sisters in Christ we willingly act in humility and service to others. With the newest proclamation: *workers and customers in face-to-face essential businesses, grocery stores etc. must wear masks*, let's notice our doubts and level of willingness or resistance to live with this new fact of life. Can we continue to have both faith that we will get through this and the discipline to facilitate it? In some countries wearing a mask is seen as sign of community mindedness, like wearing a heart on your sleeve. Ed Yong, writing for the Atlantic noted that the "single most effective weapon against the pandemic (is) the willingness of its citizens to make individual sacrifices for the sake of all."*

Christ willingly sacrificed all for every individual throughout time. Let us hold this in faith, know that God's steadfast love is living, with us, while we face the facts of what we must sacrifice for others in this time. As we continue to worship on the air, by the grace of the Holy Spirit, let's have faith we will be back together as the church, in the church in God's time. In today's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

First Reading

Acts 2:14a, 22-32

After the Holy Spirit comes to the apostles on Pentecost, Peter preaches the gospel to the gathered crowd. He tells them that Jesus, who obediently went to his death according to God's plan, was raised from the dead by God. Finally, he appeals to scripture, quoting Psalm 16:8-11, to show that Jesus is the Messiah: though crucified, the risen Jesus is now enthroned.

Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed [the crowd]:

22"You that are Israelites, listen to what I have to say: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know—23 this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. 24 But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power.²⁵For David says concerning him,

'I saw the Lord always before me,

for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; ²⁶therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope.

- ²⁷ For you will not abandon my soul to Hades,
 - or let your Holy One experience corruption.
- ²⁸You have made known to me the ways of life;
- you will make me full of gladness with your presence.'

²⁹"Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. ³⁰Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. ³¹Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying,

'He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption.'

³²This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses."

This epistle was written to encourage Christians experiencing hardships and suffering because of their faith in Christ. The letter opens by blessing God for the living hope we have through Christ's resurrection even amid difficult circumstances and surroundings.

Blessed be the God and Father of our various trials, ⁷so that the genuineness Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, ⁵who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer

of your faith-being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire-may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. 8Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, 9 for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Gospel

John 20:19-31

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. But one of their number is missing, and his unbelief prompts another visit from the Lord.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them. "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands. and put my finger in the mark of the

nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." 28 Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Open the rooms we lock, O God, to those who live without a homeland or place of safety. We pray that generous nations offer refuge and peace for all. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.
