


Fifth Sunday after Easter May 10, 2020

# REFLECTION on THE LESSONS Words and Stones

Rocks, from the jagged faces of the Rocky Mountains or the Himala-yas to rounded stones of a river bed and even the finest sand on a Pacific beach are ways that the magnificent beauty of God's creation is proclaimed. In addition to inciting awe, The Bible often uses rocks and stones as images of faith. In the lectionary readings today, Psalm 31 proclaims God's protection with "Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me. . . You are indeed my rock and my fortress." 1 Peter 2:4-5 speaks of Christ as a living stone, the cornerstone of our faith and of our church. Disciples are encouraged also to be living stones, together building up the church.

Yet in the Acts description of the martyrdom of Stephen the stones are not metaphors or symbols but the hard reality of life blunting hate in the hands of a mob. Stephens's words proclaiming God's love, faith and forgiveness may have only been heard between the clash of rocks. It is more than likely that many words of judgment and incrimination were tossed about before even the first stone was lifted.

Though this story of the first Christian martyr is set in a time nearly two thousand years ago, sadly, similar events have happened at the hands of high school bullies in our country or by proclamation of religious fundamentalists in Syria who less than a dozen years ago stoned to death a young woman who dared go against their laws. Stephen dared to go against the laws. Stephen was stoned for his fervent witness to the risen Christ yet his faith in God's protection as in Psalm 31 never wavered.

In our world, the damaging power of words is often countered by the sing-song advice my grandmother gave me: "sticks and stones will break my bones, but names will never hurt me." Yet, we know that words can be abusive, words can be hurtful, and can lead to physical abuse as well.

Can we lift that stone of disagreement, of distrust, of incrimination, of even hate and look Christ in the face, the living God that says I love you <u>and</u> the other too?

In John 8 Christ stops peoples' thoughts of raising stones against a woman with these words "Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her." Can we seriously see Christ in front of us, look Christ in the face and <u>not</u> let loose that fist holding that stone ready to be thrown? Can we not release into a gesture of thanksgiving and welcome? What a blessing if that could open up in us. Habits, our habitual ways of thinking can often be permeated with judging and blaming, and they can often become the unconscious platform for unloving or unhealthy behavior. Can we just become aware of the moment we are thinking of saying or doing something hurtful, can we become aware of that and with Christ's loving face in front of us just let it go? Can we do this in the face of our enemies too? Can we become so saturated with, so immersed in God's love that there is no way we could even lift a stone of hate or judgement?

I would like to end with a song by Ken Jacobsen that has only three simple words "I love you." You may have heard the song before but you can never hear enough of these words. I ask you to listen to this song knowing that God sings this to us in every breath we take.

You may imagine singing this to grandkids or family members you have not been able to see, or imagine a beloved one far away or even a deceased mother or loved ones singing it to you. Or hunker down with someone you've been kept at home with for over a month now and patience may be growing thin and just listen to these words together. Or rock a child when both of you don't even realize you are impatient with being at home and not seeing and playing with friends and just restoke your love.

And what about when we're on the other side? Can we listen to this song and imagine singing it to our enemies too, as Stephen, As Jesus did? Three minutes of hearing those three words may seem like a long time, but if in that time we can open to even 3 seconds of loving our enemy (even the corona virus), even 30 seconds of feeling love towards other or even a minute of knowing we are loved by God, the doors to God's house may open up for us in ways we could never imagine.

Recently I discovered a clay-animation children's series from the 60's and 70's called "Davey and Goliath". The show was produced by the Lutheran Church in America and the first episode aired in 1961. The episode even starts out with little characters playing "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" next to a Luther Rose. The main characters are a young boy named Davey and his talking dog Goliath. Together they learn to have faith in God through everyday adventures!

I watched the first episode, called "Lost in a Cave", where Davey wonders from his group while on a tour of a cave with his family and the tour guide drops everything to find and rescue Davey. Davey's father tells him that this is what God's love for him is like. I thought this show was a real treasure to find, and perhaps some of you remember it being on television on Sunday afternoons.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus says to the disciples (in verses 11 and 12) "Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the work themselves. Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing and they will do even greater things than these because I am going to the Father."

Right now, in the midst of a natural disaster, the COVID-19 pandemic, it can be easy to lose sight of God and ask, "where are you??" But this reading reminds us that God is here with us, and here within us as we reach out to help our neighbors in need. In a newer and smaller clip of Davey and Goliath from 2010, Davey is watching the news and is saddened by a report of another disaster happening, where bad things are happening to God's people in the world. Davey shares the awful news with his dog Goliath but reassures the dog that he is thankful that God is there with his people, no matter what happens. This short clip was made by the Lutheran church in America as a part of their "God's work. Our Hands" initiative, and Davey tells Goliath that "God is there through the hands of the people who help after (and in the midst of) a disaster." God is here with us now, within us and our neighbors.

May God, who gave birth to all creation, bless us: may God, who became incarnate by an earthly mother, bless us: May God bless all mothers, and all their children who are all God's children.



# First Reading

Acts 7:55-60

Stephen was one of the seven men chosen by the apostles to serve tables so that the apostles could be free to serve the word (Acts 6:1-6). Stephen does more than distribute food, however. For his preaching of God's word, he becomes the first martyr of the faith.

Filled with the Holy Spirit, [Stephen] gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. <sup>56</sup>"Look," he said, "I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" <sup>57</sup>But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. <sup>58</sup>Then they dragged him

out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. <sup>59</sup> While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." <sup>60</sup>Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

Gospel John 14:1-14

On the night that he is to be arrested, Jesus shares final words with his disciples. As the one through whom God is known, he promises to go before them and act on their behalf.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. <sup>2</sup>In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? <sup>3</sup>And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. 4And you know the way to the place where I am going." 5 Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" <sup>6</sup>Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. <sup>7</sup>If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him."

<sup>8</sup>Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied."

<sup>9</sup>Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? 10Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. 11 Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. 12 Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. 18I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. <sup>14</sup>If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it."

The prayers are prepared locally for each occasion. The following examples may be adapted or used as appropriate.

Uplifted by the promised hope of healing and resurrection, we join the people of God in all times and places in praying for the church, the world, and all who are in need.

A brief silence.

Build us up, mothering God, as living stones united in your spiritual house. Continually strengthen your church as it is sent forth to proclaim your love. We pray especially for new congregations and those in redevelopment. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Humble us, creator God, as part of your creation. Fill us with respect and awe for the world you have made, including volcanoes, ocean currents, tropical rainstorms, glaciers, and other forces that both destroy and create. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Align our ways to your love, O God. We pray for countries, leaders, and other organizations as they prepare places for those seeking refuge and safety (aid organizations may be named). Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

God of healing and rest, help those whose hearts are heavy and weighed down by many troubles. Comfort their suffering, ease their distress, and carry their burdens (*especially*). Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Nurturing God, we pray for those who tend and teach young children, for the safe pregnancies of expectant parents, and for families who struggle with infertility and miscarriage. We give thanks for all who have shown mothering care, and we remember all for whom this day is difficult. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Here other intercessions may be offered.

Generous God, you call into your brilliant light all who have died. Give us faith to take hold of the promise of your eternal life. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

With bold confidence in your love, almighty God, we place all for whom we pray into your eternal care; through Christ our Lord.

Amen.
