This is the first day in-who-knows-how-long there has not been a Memorial Day parade in Belleville. So we have begun with one of the national celebration songs from our hymn books. 
As we continue in this series of recorded broadcasts we celebrate the opportunity to bring many voices together from their homes here in Big Valley, from other states and even across the ocean. Over the last few weeks I have asked people, through email and personally to reflect on what this time during stay-at- home orders and the shut-down of church build-ings has meant to them theologically: What do you think God has been saying to you, to us, what have you learned? And I ask you to think about that during the music interludes. We will weave this sharing into our reflections on scripture, Ascension, song and prayer.

Through the Holy Spirit, let us invite Christ into our hearts through our worship today. We begin with thoughts from Gwen Hornberger. Though not verbatim she expressed: 'We again see God is greater than anything we know, greater than everything that is going on, and that God is there always, always there with us.

Scripture sent from Lisa Griffith, Philippians 4:4-7, similarly proclaims:

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice! Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Alleluia. Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. Alleluia, alleluia. HOLY GOSPEL ~ John 17:1-11 REFLECTION on THE LESSONS Rev. Ela J. Robertson

Christ's prayer to God the Father at the end of this reading from John is a prayer for unity: *Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one.* "The words 'glory' and 'glorified' repeated five times in ten verses are central to the text and it seems that the primary way Christ hopes we will glorify God is through being one, being in unity, being community. He knows we will need help, we will need God's protection to do so.

Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them (John 17:7-8)

A colleague, Tyler Downing, a former minister in our Presbytery, also ends a letter to us in the midst of Covid 19 with a call to unity and a call to profess the words, the faith that has been given us. I would like to share parts of his letter: *As people of faith, our voices must speak strongly and wisely with truth and vision. We must become true leaders within our communities, understanding both danger, wisdom, and pain. We must speak with hope in a God who still loves us. We must create new missions of caring even as we step-out into this shaken world. And, we should constantly speak with love, especially to those who are angry or who lack full understanding that this has affected them or that this is not going away simply when we say it should. We must speak and act with care and compassion to those operating in our food supply, public safety, and medical networks. We must not let ourselves become swept-up in the divisive arguments that diminish us.*

We must listen and pray, preach and lead, as well as care and <u>unite in the</u> <u>Spirit of Christ.</u>

Paul says to us through the words he sent to Ephesus: By grace we are saved thru faith and this is not of ourselves, it is the true gift of God.

These words are also reflected in a second reading Lisa Griffith sent me: 1st Corinthians 2:9-10

But, as it is written, "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him" these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God.

This could very well describe the experience of Ascension. The truth of Christ in God and God in Christ - unimaginable vision, unimaginable revelation, unimaginable glory all because God loves us.


However, as I read these first lines "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived," I immediately thought of two things. One, with Memorial Day so close - how no human heart could have conceived of the devastation of WWI nor the plague that followed the troops home from Europe, which spread in victory celebrations and wiped out more than those lost on the battlefield. No human heart could have conceived of the human atrocities of WWII and other 20th century genocides and natural catastrophes. Yet God was with us throughout.

Second, no one has seen, except through a microscope, the corona virus that spiky globe that to me looks so much like a sweet gum tree seed ball. We fear what we do not know, what we can not see. For me collecting those seed balls and making a crown for our Good Friday and Easter crosses at our two closed churches was a way to visualize, make real the deaths the virus has wrought, and the need for constant prayer it has brought. At the same time it provided a reminder that Christ wears the Crown over all. At West Kish Presbyterian I have intentionally left that ribboned palm cross and sweet gum corona crown up on the light post in front of the church. A reminder of the power of the virus, a reminder of the greater power of our triune God, and reminder to, as Acts 1:14 tells us today, to pray!

After witnessing Christ's ascension into the heavens the disciples went to the room upstairs where they were staying. All these men and women devoted themselves to constant prayer.

Let us pray.

O God of glory, sovereign of all nations, the risen and ascended Christ calls us to carry your message of life to all people. Led by the power of your Holy Spirit, may we witness always to the hope to which we are called as we share Christ's love to the end of the earth. Amen.

St. John's daycare is scheduled to open on Monday, June 1 with precautionary measures in place. *Please pray* for the children and teachers as we navigate through this process, as best we can.

In these days between Ascension and Pentecost, we gather with the disciples in the upper room, waiting for the Spirit to transform the church around the world. In today's gospel Jesus prays for his followers and for their mission in his name. Amid religious, social, and economic divisions, we seek the unity that Jesus had with his Father. Made one in baptism, we go forth to live our faith in the world, eager for the unity that God intends for the whole human family.

O God of glory, your Son Jesus Christ suffered for us and ascended to your right hand. Unite us with Christ and each other in suffering and in joy, that all the world may be drawn into your bountiful presence, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

First Reading

Acts 1:6-14

Today's reading is part of the introduction to the narrative of the outpouring of the Spirit on Pentecost. These verses tell of the risen Lord's conversation with his disciples on the eve of his ascension, in which he promises that they will receive the power of the Holy Spirit.

When [the apostles] had come together, they asked [Jesus], "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" 7He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. 8But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." 9When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

¹²Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. ¹³When they had entered the city, they went to the room upstairs where they were staying, Peter, and John, and James, and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James son of Alphaeus, and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. ¹⁴All these were constantly devoting themselves to prayer, together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.

Our faith in Christ does not make us immune from the scorn of others. Nevertheless, we are to resist the designs of evil when we experience disparagement from others because we trust God's grace will strengthen and guide us.

Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. ¹³But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. ¹⁴If you are reviled for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the spirit of glory, which is the Spirit of God, is resting on you.

John 17:1-11

On the night before his crucifixion, Jesus prays to his heavenly Father, asking that those who continue his work in this world will live in unity.

After Jesus had spoken these words [to his disciples], he looked up to heaven and said, "Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, ²since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. ³And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. ⁴I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. 5So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed.

⁶"I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. ⁷Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; 8 for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. 9I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. ¹⁰All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. ¹¹And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one."

Prayers of Intercession

The prayers are prepared locally for each occasion. The following examples may be adapted or used as appropriate.

Uplifted by the promised hope of healing and resurrection, we join the people of God in all times and places in praying for the church, the world, and all who are in need.

A brief silence.

O God, call your people to be one, as you are one. Unite your church in the truth of your gospel, the love of our neighbor, and the call to proclaim your reign to all people. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Breathe life into your creation. Guide your people as we explore the mysteries of the universe. We pray for the work of scientists and mathematicians whose skill enriches our understanding (like Nicholas Copernicus and Leonard Euler, whom the church commemorates today). Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Make your justice known among the nations of the earth. Protect the vulnerable (especially in nations currently in crisis). Redirect those who use violence and greed as weapons. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Preparing for Next Week
