

MESSAGE ~ *Praying With*

Today is the first Sunday of August 2020, and the news leads us to believe that, with the upsurge in Covid cases and continued unrest and divisiveness, this could be an 'awful' August. However, as I have prayed about where we are now and where we go from here two things have been put on my heart:

- 1. that we focus on prayer during this month and
- 2. that through our outreach and ministry we make this an 'Awesome August!' Emperor Caesar Augustus, the name sake for this month, issued the census decree which brought Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem where God incarnate, Jesus Christ was born. The world has continued to be awestruck by this event. Augustus' reign was known for the awful practices of subjugation, persecution and mass crucifixion. Yet Christ's crucifixion soon put an end to this practice, and the resurrection and promise of grace and salvation has continued to be a source of awe, reverence and joy.

As we engage in exploring prayer this month let us always begin with this reverence, this praise, this awe and this joy and share this with others.

Last week's reading from 1 Kings asks "What do we pray for?, Who do we pray for?" When Solomon asked God for wisdom he was praying for himself but not just for himself, for the people he would be serving as well. What do we pray for and who do we hope this prayer will benefit? Our prayers may benefit ourselves, others we know and have benefits beyond what we can imagine.

Romans 8 and 9 ask the questions we may often ask ourselves: 'Do we even know how to pray?' These verses ask not only 'Who do we pray for?' but 'Who will help us?' Paul answers: "The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words." (Romans 8:26) Verses 27 tell us God helps us: God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

So the Holy Spirit is with us, the triune God is there with us, the Messiah who is over all is with us. We are not a sole figure kneeling at the bedside at night, if we're arthritis free enough to do that. We are not a sole figure in our living room closing our eyes for a moment of prayer when we feel, as in Romans 9:2: "I have great sorrow and unceasing anguish in my heart." How many of us, when a friend asks 'How are you?' would answer with these words? Yet, sometimes in grief, in worry we do feel this way.

We can remember though, we are with forces far greater than the sensation of the hard floor on our knees, or the rising choking feeling of tears in our chest. We are not alone in prayer.

How do we pray? We begin with this truth: within the power of the Holy Trinity is everything we need to pray to, to pray with and to pray for us. We pray with thanksgiving for life and creation, we pray with supplication for healing and wisdom so that we may serve God's creation, we pray with awesome appreciation for being made children of God through Christ.

The river of prayer is always there for us to enter in. We may begin at any time - any second or minute of our day. We may find our self brought to prayer at a random moment, a moment of thanksgiving, or of remembrance of loss, or a sense of need, or experience of pain or an experience of joy during our day.

Please remember, during this awesome month of August to pray, even if for a moment, for yourself, for others and for the world. Then reach out to others with a testimony, a gesture of caring and comfort, an expression of beauty and joy. The powers you pray with will do the rest.

We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. (Romans 8:28)

In awe of all God has done and will do in us during this month. Amen.

Just a bit about me:

I grew up in a suburb of Chicago and moved to Pennsylvania when I was in high school. Shortly after earning a Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood and Elementary Education from Bloomsburg University, my husband and I settled in this area of PA and I was employed as a substitute teacher in several of the local school districts. I then had the privilege of staying home with my children, but during that time I also held a part-time position as one of the directors of the children's department in my church. When the Lord called our family to change churches, He led us to Calvary Bible Church where I immediately became involved in the Awana program. After serving as a leader for several years, I took over as the director of the program and have served in that role for the past 8 years. During that time, I was also blessed to be able to home school my children through their elementary years.

I look forward to working with the children and their families, and I am committed to upholding the high-quality, Christ-centered early education and care environment to which St. John's is dedicated.

Notes from the Pastor:

Home Blessings: For those of us choosing to stay home rather than go out on Sundays our home has become our sanctuary. *Home Blessings will be postponed for now*. However as soon as feasible I hope to offer a curbside visit and a short service for a Blessing of a Home for all who request it.

Cards: Cards, candy, flowers and food continue to be a great uplift to those home bound and a visible reminder of the prayers and encouragement we offer. Thank you to those who are reaching out in that way. I know those at Valley View especially have been uplifted by this.

Challenges, Controversies & Encouragement: We are a church that embraces differences - in everything from opinions to hair styles and beard lengths. When we feel uncomfortable with what we hear in church, particular words, songs or messages. We are being challenged to explore differences and hear beyond our present circumstances to the heart of Gods message for us and beyond us. When, as some of you do, you let the pastor know how you are feeling we can explore this further together and be encouraged in unity in Christ.

There will be a Blood drive with Covid antibody testing. The Amish clinic is sponsoring a Red Cross blood drive on Monday, August 10th at Locust Grove Mennonite Church that will also involve testing for COVID antibodies so that blood donated by be beneficial to those struggling with COVID.

Perhaps a group of St. Johns folks would like to go?







Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy?


Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food.

R This begins a new section in Paul's letter in which he will deal with the place of Israel in God's saving plan. He opens by highlighting how Israel's heritage and legacy include being God's children, having God's covenants, being given God's law, participating in worship of God, and receiving divine promises.

I am speaking the truth in Christ—I am not lying; my conscience confirms it by the Holy Spirit—²I have great sorrow and unceasing anguish in my heart. ³For I could wish that I myself were accursed and cut off from Christ for the sake of my own people, my kindred according to

the flesh. ⁴They are Israelites, and to them belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, and the promises; ⁵to them belong the patriarchs, and from them, according to the flesh, comes the Messiah, who is over all, God blessed forever. Amen.

Gospel

Matthew 14:13-21

After John the Baptist is murdered, Jesus desires a time of solitude. Still, his compassion for others will not allow him to dismiss those who need him, and he is moved to perform one of his greatest miracles.

Now when Jesus heard [about the beheading of John the Baptist], he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. ¹⁵When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." ¹⁶Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you

give them something to eat." ¹⁷They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." ¹⁸And he said, "Bring them here to me." ¹⁹Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. ²⁰And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. ²¹And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

You offer freely the fullness of salvation. Give our congregation (name) such a welcoming heart, that our words and actions may extend your free and abundant hospitality to all whom we encounter. Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

Here other intercessions may be offered.

You gather your saints as one, united in the body of Jesus. Bring us with all your saints to the heavenly banquet. We remember with love and thanksgiving the saints we have known (*especially*). Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.
