

HEALING and WHOLENESS

What are our prayers? What do we hope for, long for? Are there some things in the world we find so distressing but so powerless to change it seems all we can do is pray?

Are there times we feel so overwhelmed we don't even know how to shape the prayers we know we want to pray?

The words of Paul's letter to the Romans 8:26-28 - this translation from the Living Bible and the NRSV - offers us comfort and assurance in this:

26 And in the same way—by our faith[e]—the Holy Spirit helps us with our daily problems and in our praying. For we don't even know what we should pray for nor how to pray as we should, but the Holy Spirit prays for us with such feeling that it cannot be expressed in words. 27 And the Father who knows all hearts knows, of course, what the Spirit is saying as he pleads for us in harmony with God's own will.

And from the New Revised Standard Version: *28 And we know that all things work together for good for those who love God.*

Other translations of Romans 8 use the expression “the Spirit intercedes with groanings too deep for words.” I am always deeply touched by the prayers brought forward in a Healing and Wholeness service as I was again on our fifth Sunday in July. A Healing and Wholeness service gives us the opportunity to acknowledge those ‘groanings’ that often manifest as complaints or frustration and instead gives us words to express them as prayers for God's intercession.

People bring forward their prayers individually, prayers for themselves so that they may function better in their relationships and the work they do for others; prayers for others that they will be healed and strengthened and kept safe; and most of all prayers for our church, our community and our world that we may find unity and peace and a better world for our young ones to live into.

More than one word in this passage from Romans is based on the Greek root ‘syn’ or ‘sym’. ‘*Synergeo*’ from “We know that all things ‘work together’ is one and the word for ‘helps’ comes from a long and loaded Greek word, ‘*synantilambanomai*.’ We know this root ‘syn-’ from words like ‘synthesis’ or ‘synergy’ or closely related ‘sympathy’ or ‘symphony.’ When we come together to express our deepest desires for ourselves, others and the world we bring our prayers to work together in harmony with, in sympathy with the Holy Spirit, with Christ, with the Creator and with each other. We create a synergy, a symphony that we believe will resound in the world in time fulfilling and restoring God's peace.

The strength, sensitivity, unity and faith expressed in the St. Johns community is evident in these prayers. I have to say this makes it difficult for me to think about transition as the Call committee continues to work on creating a church profile in preparation for seeking a new pastor, and Huntingdon presbytery churches continue to investigate partnerships of which I could be a part. We hope to hear official updates as Council and other committees meet in the coming weeks.

As the sun rises this morning, broad rays of light streak through dark clouds touching Big Valley from the steeple of St. Johns to Allensville. We are reminded once again that God works with us (Gr. ‘*synergeo*’) in all that we do and that “all things will work together for good.”

NEWS from the ELCA & the PARLIAMENT OF WORLD RELIGIONS
with excerpts from the message on Sunday August 27

One of my goals for the conference of World Religions was to see how the Lutheran and Presbyterian denominations played out in the global religious community. Although there were not many Protestants at the conference I was not disappointed.

One of the highlights for me was hearing the Chicago community choir - their rehearsals and performances housed, supported and sponsored by the Presbytery of Chicago - bringing together in this rather segregated city people from the neighborhoods from the North and the South, creating music so infused with the breath and fire of the spirit, you could not help but be moved, changed and affirmed in your faith


I also had an opportunity to meet the Presiding bishop of the ELCA, Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, pass on greetings from Bishop Miller and catch a quick conversation with her. An excellent workshop was offered by a Lutheran minister and representative on the consultative panel task force for Lutheran - Jewish relations which had been meeting with her office over the last year.

This committee, made up of representatives of several denominations and faiths met together to identify: Problematic interpretations and perspectives on the identity of the early Church drawn from the early Jewish communities and problematic interpretations of the Jewish identity of Jesus himself and of his message. For each problematic perspective - i.e. ones that could tend to stereotype or even demean the religion of which Jesus and all of his disciples were a part, a 'better' alternative is offered, one that respects the wisdom of the Torah as living alongside not cancelled out by the wisdom of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The panel *"hoped that readers will increasingly identify with the spirit and approach of this guide, finding it helpful for the tasks of ministry and for building up the body of Christ, particularly in our understanding of Jews and Judaism."* And the speaker added that this this outline can be applied to a better understanding of and respect for other world religions whether referenced in the Bible or not.

The guide is available from the ELCA as a downloadable document or you may ask Pastor Ela for a copy. I will continue to reference other take-aways from the 'Parliament of World Religions' in the coming weeks. The little I have shared about this conference is not the same as being there, but everyone of us can imagine opening our hearts to people around the world in turbans, and saris, serapes and ponchos who like us have belief that through God we are called to create a world where people can live in peace and unity.

We need to acknowledge the prejudices and perspectives that dismiss or degrade or meet with fear those who are different than us. We need to approach with humility the gifts of understanding and love given us through Jesus Christ. We need to claim our own identity as Christians and as the church and live into our identity that sings "They will know we are Christians by our love." Let us extend this love to like purposed individuals of all denominations and faiths in our country and around the world. Let us expand our vision of what is possible in the world when we do.

Daycare

In order to comply with state regulations, the daycare is required to upgrade the type of smoke detectors being used throughout the building.
