

The Epistle to the Hebrews, one of Martin Luther's favorite books of the Bible, says that the Word of God is a living and active word, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit, of joints and marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Not only that, but the book of Hebrews says that before Him (The Lord God Almighty), no creature is hidden, but all are open and laid bare to the eyes of Him with whom we have to do (Hebrews 4:12-13).

Those are very powerful words. Hebrews says that God's Word is a very powerful word indeed and when God speaks, we are not to take His words lightly. Whether God's word is a word of judgment or mercy; whether His word is filled with warnings or hope, we are to listen carefully to what is being said to us, because words are always powerful, whether it is the Lord who speaks them or whether we are the ones who speak and hear them.

When I was child and sometimes would get into arguments with my friends over who knows what, and often after some very harsh, unkind, cutting words were hurled back and forth like missiles in a war zone, someone sooner or later would say, "Sticks and stones may break my bones but words will never hurt me." You too, I am sure have heard that said and perhaps you have said those words yourself a time or two in your life.

The implication is that a fist landing at the end of your nose may cause you a great deal of pain, but mean and nasty words thrown in your direction can't hurt you at all. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Words do in fact have enormous power and they can either cut us deeply or bring healing to our souls.

If someone says, "I hate you!" or "You're such a fool!" or "I cannot stand to be around you any longer" that hurts. You may deny the pain of it all, but if we are honest with ourselves we know that deep down we have been deeply wounded. I got into only one physical altercation that I can remember when I was kid and to be honest I cannot remember any physical scars that I came away with from that fight.

But I can still remember words that were hurtful that I said to others and words that were just as hurtful that were said to me. Many of the things I remember best from my childhood are the painful moments in interactions with friends and family.

On the other hand, when someone says to us, "I care about you deeply," or "I Love you and forgive what you have done to me," or "Your life is precious to God and to me," those words bring with them the balm of healing. God's love for us in Christ is a powerful word which says "You are mine. I have created you and I have blessed you and will bless you still. I love you with an eternal love that shall never die.!" Those are very powerful words that all of us need to hear and hear often and never forget them!

Thanks to your support, Seafarer's International assisted 19,066 people in need, well over 1,000 more than last year! At Christmas time we rejoiced! Our Port Chaplains were able to bring a ministry of presence, essentials, and transportation to seafarers, and we delivered a record setting 3,507 satchels to seafarers out at sea spreading love around the globe.

#### MISSION

Seafarers International House (SIH) is the Lutheran response to the urgent needs of vulnerable seafarers and immigrants.

SIH offers hospitality, social assistance, and advocacy to a multi-national and multi-faith community in the Ports of Albany, Baltimore, Duluth, New Haven, and New York & New Jersey, and in New York City

## **2024 Program Impact**

**19,066** immigrants and seafarers directly benefited from SIH services (up from 18,004).

**2,225 lodging nights** provided to 140 seafarers in Manhattan.

**13,556 seafarers** were visited and counseled on 1,232 ships, receiving essentials they requested.

**1,830 seafarers** were transported to a mall or medical facilities.

3,507 seafarers, regardless of faith, received Christmas-at-Sea satchels filled with warm clothing and holiday greetings prepared by volunteers to recognize their sacrifices. Up from 3,216 last year!
33 asylum seekers received lodging for a total of 1,508 nights. They hailed from Bulgaria, Burkina Faso,

Chad, Colombia, Cuba, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ecuador, El Salvador, Gambia, Ghana, Guatemala, Guinea, Haiti, Honduras and Mexico.

## **Daycare December Report**

#### **Enrollment:**

43

Infant enrolled, coming full-time in January. Two children un-enrolled, Mother has new job in State College and moved them to daycare close to her work. Two potential preschool children coming for tour on Monday. Need immediate care, may start January 2.

#### Staff:

8 staff ~ One member of staff quit. She had ongoing health problems, and was habitually absent and/or late. Two girls very recently expressed interest in working at daycare, one part-time. Waiting on applications to be returned. Pre-K counts hired a part-time classroom aide, and she will be paid strictly from the Pre-k grant.

**Christmas:** Daycare is closing at 1:30 on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve.

## Fundraising:

The Gift Show went very well. Still waiting on amount made from selling Kish Valley Soaps for Amish who took over the business, but we made approx. \$5,000. Of that 10% (\$500) was tithed to the church towards fuel oil. The girls will each be receiving a small Christmas Bonus and the balance is going to help pay expenses. Custodial, classroom supplies and snacks are becoming more expensive to keep in stock.

## **Keystone STARS**

Grant received and is being used for teacher retention bonuses, as instructed.
